<p>Procedures: <i>(Include procedures for differentiating instruction)</i></p>	<p>Exploration/Introduction:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Before reading the book, have students make predictions about what the book is about 2. Read <i>Juneteenth for Mazie</i> to the class 3. Discuss the book <p>Lesson Development:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Discuss the meaning of emancipation 2. Chart students' ideas on a chart entitled "Emancipation" <p>Expansion:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Compare and contrast Juneteenth and Fourth of July 2. Students will write a short paragraph on why they think it is important to continue celebrating Juneteenth.
